

Basic Principles of Right and Wrong in Christianity

The Gospels do not offer an extensive set of rules, nor even one law to be enforced.^A
The Gospels teach key principles, so the individual must think and reflect, to apply these to human life.

	God	Other People
Love	Love God with all your heart, and soul, and mind.	Love your neighbour as yourself and love your enemies (shown in the Parable of the Good Samaritan.)
Forgiveness	God forgives those are are truly sorry for their bad acts.	Forgive those who do bad things against you.

Most Christians reject any description of Christianity as a “religion of the book”.^B
Christian teaching describes the conscience as “the voice of God” within each person.^C
Examination of conscience is a regular & fundamental part of many Christian lives.^D

- A This is referenced, for example, albeit implicitly, in Article VII of the *Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion* of the Church of England.
B Notably, the Catholic Catechism explicitly states that Christianity is *not* a “religion of the book”. Statistically, Catholics are about half of all Christians.
C Notably Saint Augustine, & much later, J. H. Newman. See also: Catechism of the Catholic Church, Part 3, Sect. 1, Ch. 1, Art. 6 (particularly parag. 1776)
D Catholic & Orthodox Christians are required to examine their consciences regularly. Protestantism is diverse, & Protestant attitudes vary greatly.

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
