

Statement of Non-Applicability of Copyright

The images of texts of At-Tabari (A.D. 839 - 923) and Ibn Kathir (A.D. 1300 - 1373) are not subject to copyright for the following reasons:

1) Original language reproduction of old historic texts cannot be copyrighted. Texts which are this old are without copyright and no copyrightable activity, such as translation, has taken place on the original text. It might be noted that introduction, footnotes and explanation may well be copyrightable, but even if included, are subject to fair dealing (known in some countries as fair use). However, footnotes have been removed in order to limit usage only to the original text.

2) If the text were copyrighted, the usage here, which is non-commercial, would in any case be covered by the concept of *fair dealing* (known in some countries as *fair use*). Fair dealing covers use:

- For education and/or instruction
- For personal research
- For criticism

3) The images themselves, which have been made of these texts, as opposed to the texts themselves, are declared to be in the public domain.
